

**MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE
CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWTHORNE,
CALIFORNIA HELD MAY 23, 2006.**

Mayor/Chairman Guidi called the City Council, Community Redevelopment Agency and Parking Authority meeting to order jointly and concurrently at 6:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers of City Hall, 4455 West 126th Street, Hawthorne, California.

ROLL CALL-Present: Councilmembers Catano, Lambert, Parsons, Velez, Mayor Guidi.
Absent: None.

Deacon Tom Moske from St. Joseph Church gave the evening's Invocation. Ferris Schick led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Guidi presented a short video honoring the men and women in the military.

Councilmember Lambert presented a Proclamation to Mrs. Mildred Harrison for being selected as the Older American Honoree for the City of Hawthorne.

Mr. Jan Vogel, Executive Director for the SBWIB announced that the Hawthorne Education Foundation held their first golf tournament fund-raiser event last year and it brought in enough money to provide every school in Hawthorne with \$1,000. The next tournament fundraiser is scheduled for June 26th at Chester Washington.

Under oral communications, **Paul Lowe** reported that there is a problem with trash pick up in the Holly Park area. It seems that every other week, trash is picked up on a different days other than the regularly scheduled ones. **Allen Richards** wished City Manager Rick Prentice well on his retirement. Asked that something be done to safeguard pedestrians crossing Hawthorne Blvd., especially when there is an activity that would cause many people to cross the boulevard like there was on May 6th at 136th and Hawthorne. Reported that witnesses have periodically seen up to two HPD vehicles speeding through stop signs on Ramona Ave. between Rosescrans and El Segundo without sirens or flashing lights, usually at night. Also reported that most vehicles ignore the stop signs in the Ramona tract usually when people are going to and from work and after dark. **Ferris Schick** wished Richard Prentice a great retirement. Thanked Council for attending the Bodger Park Association meeting last night. Reported that street sweeping in his area has not been on schedule for the last two weeks. Asked for clarification on what holidays the streets are being swept. **Joseph Serrato** and **Jaime Hernandez**, members of Local 802, reported violations at the Aviation and El Segundo demolition project. **Frances Stiglich** asked for a couple of buses and a kitchen for the seniors. Suggested that the Sheriff take over the police department because she feels the police department isn't strong enough to deal with rising crime and it would also save money.

Councilmember **Velez** apologized for not being able to attend the K-9 Dinner due to his wife's graduating from Dominguez Hills.

Councilmember **Velez** attended the Home Depot Child Safety Fair.

Councilmember **Catano** attended the K-9 dinner and Home Depot event. He also thanked Rosalinda Martinez for obtaining all the gifts that were donated for the safety fair.

Councilmember **Catano** announced that it is a law that Council members report as to what was done on trips paid for by the city. He went on to explain what was accomplished at the International Mall Developer's Convention in Las Vegas that he attended along with City Attorney Glen Shishido. In brief, the following occurred: met with the Charles Company for an update on the Hawthorne Mall and stated that two big box retailers are interested and negotiations have begun with one of them; met with the Buxton Organization who measure the demographics of cities; met with Hopkins Real Estate Group who specialize in urban infield and brownfield development; met with Regency Center who expressed interest in the Inglewood/Rosecrans area and any other area on the north side; met with the Festival Company who is interested in the north side; met with Factory Outlet, but they would need 15 acres we don't have and met with a developer that builds IHOP restaurants who expressed extreme interest in the city.

Councilmember **Parsons** asked that we form some kind of system to immediately notify the homeowner's associations when there are incidents in the city that threaten children like the incident that happened recently where a young male was kidnapping girls.

Councilmember **Parsons** has noticed an increase in graffiti since stores are no longer locking up spray paint and he asked that copies of the city ordinance be sent to such businesses to remind them that displays selling spray paint must be locked at all times. He also reminded everyone that there is a 24 hour graffiti hotline.

Councilmember **Parsons** thanked Mr. Allen Richards for his reports.

Councilmember **Lambert** encouraged everyone to attend the Memorial Day Services at the Memorial Center on Monday, May 29, 2006 at 10 am.

Councilmember **Lambert** inquired about installing crosswalk warning flashing lights across Hawthorne Blvd and also inquired about personally purchasing "Kids at Play" signs to put on resident's lawns and near schools.

Councilmember **Lambert** thanked Ms. Lisa Miller for providing a ticket report.

- Extending width of residential driveways by 2 feet. (Lambert)

Councilmember **Lambert** feels that residents should be able to add two feet to the front of their homes in order to park two cars in the driveway, thereby reducing the number of parked cars on overcrowded streets. This would only apply to lots that are wide enough and the balance of the lawn would have to be maintained.

Mayor **Guidi** thanked Rosalinda Martinez, Public Works, the Police Department and the Fire Fighters for making the Children's Safety Fair a successful event.

Mayor **Guidi** thanked retiring City Manager Rick Prentice for his many years of service at the Police Department and his 2 1/2 years as City Manager.
