

**MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE
CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWTHORNE,
CALIFORNIA HELD MAY 22, 2007.**

Mayor Guidi called the City Council, Community Redevelopment Agency, Parking Authority, and Housing Authority meeting to order jointly and concurrently at 6:05 p.m. in the City Council Chambers of City Hall, 4455 West 126th Street, Hawthorne, California.

ROLL CALL-Present: Councilmembers Catano, Lambert, Velez, Parsons, Mayor Guidi.

Absent: None.

Civil Service Commissioner Darlene Love gave the evening's invocation. The Hawthorne Police Officers Color Guard led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Pro Tem Velez presented Proclamations honoring Hawthorne Police Officers Jeffrey Rand and Jose Saldana for their dedicated and loyal service to our country while serving in Iraq.

Councilmember Lambert presented a Proclamation to the Hawthorne Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2075 Ladies Auxiliary thanking them for their 75 years as a premier Hawthorne good neighbor.

Mayor Guidi called Richard Lundquist and Alan McKenzie from Plaza El Segundo who presented a check to the Hawthorne Education Foundation. Mr. Jan Vogel, President of the Hawthorne Education Foundation and Mr. Donald Carrington, Hawthorne School District Superintendent received \$750,000 on behalf of the Foundation.

Mayor Guidi presented a brief video on events held around the city.

1.

Closed Session: Conference with Legal Counsel - Anticipated Litigation, Significant exposure to litigation pursuant to subdivision (b)(1) of Section 54956.9 (One potential case). [District Attorney Investigation – City approved developments located at Imperial Highway & Freeman Avenue]

This closed session was not held by the City Council.

2.

Mayor Pro Tem **Velez** thanked all those who worked on the events from the video. Attended the Child Health and Safety Fair, which had a great turnout. Announced that May 15th was Police Officer Memorial Day, which is honored by wearing a blue ribbon in support of the dedicated men and women of the police force.

Councilmember **Catano** thanked Rosalinda Martinez for the great job in getting all the prizes for the Safety Fair raffle. Went to Sacramento to lobby elected officials for transportation, streets and a bike path.

Councilmember **Parsons** asked for a report on how the new trash contractor is doing. Announced that on June 1st Allied Waste will take over the commercial hauling. Inquired on the new accounting rules for long term obligations such as health insurance for retirees. Attended the K-9 dinner. Requested a monthly report on how many calls we get for service outside Hawthorne for the helicopter and how much money we receive for the new program.

Councilmember **Lambert** attended city events and thanked Rosalinda Martinez for the Safety Fair. Congratulated Mayor Guidi for being reappointed to the Architectural Board.

Mayor **Guidi** asked that the public support and stand behind the Council in order to continue the great things happening in the city. Thanked the public and the business owners that are investing in the community. Mayor Guidi talked about his action/discussion item:

- Re-launch Hawthorne Police Department's helicopter program.

Stated that the Hawthorne helicopter will only fly in Hawthorne airspace. If any other city uses the helicopter, they will have to pay first.

Mayor Guidi moved, seconded by Councilmember Catano, to re-launch Hawthorne Police Department's helicopter program.

Mayor Guidi also stated that he has received many complaints regarding loitering and inquired if we have an ordinance regarding this issue. Also inquired on ordinances or restrictions regarding massage parlors. Announced that the city has been working with MTA and has received \$3million for the Crenshaw Blvd. improvement. An additional \$800,000 to supplement this project may also be available from the South Bay Council of Governments. Stated that the FAA has tentatively allocated \$4,000,965 towards the Hawthorne Airport Runway reconstruction project.

City Treasurer **Lubenec** stated the city is moving forward and that it is very kid and business orientated.

Under oral communications, **Robert Steinhauer**, 12841 Jefferson Ave., asked that the celebration of Independence Day not be curtailed by reducing the time that safe and sane fireworks may be included in that celebration. If the citizens of Hawthorne need restrictions on when and how they celebrate Independence Day, then that should be brought before the community at the next public election rather than by resolutions. **Allen Richards**, 13828 S. Ramona Ave., feels fireworks on July 4th should be extended until midnight instead of 10p.m. Also suggested that we just get rid of fireworks altogether like other cities in the South Bay or that the city, the chamber of commerce and private industry could come up with the money to have a fireworks display at a local high school. Inquired on what happened to the recycling center at 118th Street by Ralph's. Inquired on what would happen to the Ramona Neighborhood picnic if Ordinance 1890 passes, as it would ban propane barbeques in city parks. **Ferris Schick**, 3712 W. 147th St., asked that the police department figure out a way to tell how long an RV has been parked on a street as he recently returned from a trip and had only parked his RV for an hour when a citation was already being written before the 48 hour time limit that is allowed for parking. **Robert Ferrell** feels it is an error to enforce a restriction to stop setting off fireworks at 10 pm when they are allowed to be sold until midnight. Suggested the helicopter be used to spot the use of illegal fireworks. Would like to see an Applebee's restaurant in the city. **Alex Monteiro**, 12413 Ramona Ave., thanked Arnie Shadbehr for writing a letter to Southern Pacific Railway but reported that they have not yet responded to the letter and that there is still vandalism happening in his complex. **Frances Stiglich**, 11534 Gale Ave., feels the city clerk position does not have enough to do and suggested just appointing the deputy city clerk. Reported loitering at the train depot near Eucalyptus. Wants a hospital to come back to the city instead of building more housing on the previous hospital lot that is now closed. **Ileana Talumez**, 4431 132nd #2, asked for assistance from the city because she is being harassed and taunted by people and is the victim of a community hater Internet network. **Vincent Buono** 4751 W. 137th St., asked if something could be done regarding zoning ordinance 17.38.050 as it does not allow homeowners to develop their property. **Darlene Love** reported on a large truck that parks at 119th and Van Ness.

It’s making an awful mess in our city. I just wanted to have you think about that because we’re in conflict of what we all profess to believe that we want to protect our trees and our earth with clean air. So please put that into your brains and think about it. I realize that perhaps those non-profits who are using this as their major fundraiser may be hurt by it but I just want to put that on the record because it’s an important issue. We can’t be in favor of saving the earth and the air and on the other hand polluting it. So you all have to make up your mind what you really want”.
