

**MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE  
CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWTHORNE,  
CALIFORNIA HELD JULY 28, 2009.**

Mayor Guidi called the City Council, Community Redevelopment Agency, Parking Authority and Housing Authority meeting to order jointly and concurrently at 6:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers of City Hall, 4455 West 126th Street, Hawthorne, California.

ROLL CALL-Present: Councilmembers Catano, Juarez, Lambert, Parsons, Mayor Guidi.  
Absent: None.

Reverend Tom Moske of St. Joseph's Church gave the evening's invocation. Patricia Feldman led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Edgar Ontiveros, Community Organizer for Youth Against Smoking Coalition, explained that the coalition is made up of local community supporters and several youth from the Teen Center. He spoke on how earlier this year a number of youth volunteered their time to learn about tobacco access to minors while participating in youth purchase surveys. Although the City already has an ordinance regarding tobacco and youth, they would like a fee established to help support this ordinance. Rudy Ortega participated in the Hawthorne Youth Purchase Surveys and reported that out of 65 stores that they visited, 32.8% were willing to sell tobacco to minors. Deborah Levi, Outreach Specialist for the Tobacco Prevention Program of Valley Community Clinic in North Hollywood, shared her experiences while working in the city of San Fernando. In that city, 38.5% of the tobacco retailers were willing to sell tobacco to the youth. As a result that Council voted in October of 2008 to add a proposed \$250 annual fee to their tobacco retail license ordinance.

Councilmember Juarez presented a Proclamation honoring Firefighter/Paramedic Richard Conejo, 2009 Firefighter of the Year in recognition of his dedicated service to the people of Hawthorne.

Councilmember Lambert presented a clip on motivational speaker Nick Vujicic. He is scheduled to appear at the Memorial Center on September 25<sup>th</sup>.

Under oral communications, **John Koppelman**, President Del Aire Neighborhood Association, announced that the Hawthorne farmer's market is now four weeks old and although it operates on a shoe string budget, sales are in an upward trend each week. He also thanked all those who made the market possible, especially the president and treasurer of the Hollyglen Homeowners Association. The Farmer's Market operates on Saturdays from 9am to 1pm. Everyone is welcome. **Olivia Valentine**, 2519 W. 115<sup>th</sup> Pl., Vice President Hollypark Homeowners Association, reported that at their July 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, the association spoke against the state taking local city money to balance its budget. Twenty members of the association sent letters to Governor Schwarzenegger, Speaker Karen Bass and Senator Rod Wright. **Allen Richards**, 13828 Ramona Ave., reported on a fireworks survey that he sent out after the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. **Gordon Mego**, 4535 W. 141<sup>st</sup> St., spoke on ideas for the revitalization of the former Hawthorne Plaza. **Phillip Jones**, 11549 Tarron Ave. enjoyed the car show and thanked everybody who participated and got it going. **Norb Huber**, 13919 Eucalyptus Ave., reported that over 200 people attended the Ramona picnic last Saturday. Invited everyone to attend National Night Out at Ramona Park on August 4<sup>th</sup>. Announced that a political action group, Citizens Against Helicopter Noise in the Hawthorne Area, has been formed due to noise from low flying helicopter noise in the Ramona tract. **Mike Talleda** spoke in favor of keeping firework stands in Hawthorne as they help non-profit groups. **Don Rowe**, Hawthorne Library, announced that the summer reading program is going great and that their teen center is finally complete. Asked that teens come to the meeting room to contribute an art activity to the teen center to make it their own. **Jennifer Harris**, with the Asian American Drug Abuse Program, encouraged Council to pass the tobacco retail license tonight. **Nilo Michelin** of the Hawthorne School District gave an update of what is going on with the district. Stated that they are against cutting any teacher or any other employee. They have modernized their schools, eliminated portable classrooms, test scores are continuously rising and are continuing with class size reduction. Their charter school is ranked 56 in the nation. **Darlene Love**, 2003 W. 116<sup>th</sup> St., announced that a K- 8 charter school will be opening at 2506 W. Imperial Highway. Stated that there is a prostitution problem on Imperial and asked that it be cleaned

up. **Francis Stiglich**, 11534 Gale Ave., thanked the city for fixing up 116<sup>th</sup>. Reported that there is a garbage and smoking problem at the empty lot in front of her house.

Mayor Pro Tem Lambert and City Clerk English left the dais right before Elected Officials Reports and Recommendations.

#### Elected Officials Reports and Recommendations:

Councilmember **Parsons** announced that there will be a get together for the people who took the CERT training back in April. It will be held on August 8<sup>th</sup> at the Memorial Center at 10am. So that the homeowner associations can better communicate to a command center in case of an earthquake, a radio link will try to be set up at the meeting. Those interested in participating in the next CERT training can also attend this meeting. The Hawthorne Police Citizen's Academy will begin on August 5<sup>th</sup>. Reported that the farmers market is a success and there have been no parking problems since a lot of people either walk or ride their bikes to the market. Thanked Chief Heffner for the all out effort made by the police to control illegal fireworks. For next year would like to work with the county sheriff to control the illegal fireworks in the Wiseburn county track. Was proud to recently tour the SpaceX facilities. Apologized to the Ramona Neighborhood Association for not attending their picnic for the first time in eight years.

Mayor **Guidi** thanked everyone for their cooperation and support on the Hawthorne Car Show and to Thierry Lubenec for all his help with cleanup. Thanked staff for the recent addition of park rangers and the sting in the parks. Would like to look into the possibility of doing a receivership program on problem apartments and liquor stores. Thanked the South Bay Brokers Association for inviting him to be a guest speaker a couple of weeks ago. Would like to see the motorcycle officers increased to five. Thanked everyone who has been working hard to improve the community. Encouraged all to patronize new restaurant The Isla de Mambo near Imperial and Hawthorne and also to visit that area of town as the area has been greatly improved. Requested that speed humps be looked into for Hawthorne Way near the schools and the daycare. Met with community leaders in the Del Aire area who are upset regarding a commercial/residential project of approximately 5.9 acres. Asked that a letter of protest be sent regarding this project and the Hollywood Park project.

Councilmember **Juarez** thanked Pastor Phil Cookes and his Teen Challenge volunteers for making the car show happen. Suggested that next year there be two separate venues. Kids on skateboards and bikes were a problem that should be restricted for next year. Attended the SPCA Kittenpalooza and thanked the Boy Scout who made it his eco project to build a fence for the dogs to run around at the shelter. Attended the Ramona neighborhood picnic. Formally welcomed Jose Gutierrez as the city's new information technology manager. Congratulated staff for the reduction of overtime since 2007 which has resulted in a savings of \$338,000. Inquired on the crosswalk at 120<sup>th</sup> & Truro; it will be agendized for the next meeting. Cautioned residents that Goldenstate Water Company has started stage one water conservation implementation and there are penalties involved if you go over your assigned limit. While attending a SBCCOG meeting, was introduced to the "No Drugs Down the Drain" program. Suggested this program be implemented in the city whereby a drop off box would be provided so residents can drop off their drugs instead of having them end up in the ocean. Announced that there is still room at the Da Vinci Charter School for any student that is interested.

City Treasurer **Lubenec** stated that eight out of 10 firework stands always end up west of the city which crowds the eight stands. It would better if they were spread out.

#### Discussion/Action Items:

- Implement a formal policy on minimum reserve requirement in the General Fund. (Guidi)

Mayor Guidi spoke on how reserves should only be used in case of emergencies. Right now we have a 20% informal limit. While there is no hard or fast rule regarding reserves throughout the state, the City would like to implement a formal policy of keeping the reserves at 20%. Then Council would have the option of when to or not dip into the reserves.

- Fireworks – Law Enforcement Report. (Guidi)

There were less illegal fireworks this year. The key is education and while this won't curb the problem, it will put a dent in it. A more detailed report will come back at the next City Council meeting.

- Store front façade – nuisance problems when businesses not maintained. (Guidi)

Mayor Guidi met with members of the community who are fed up with the way property owners, especially those where large parcels of land are concerned, are abandoning their properties and not keeping them clean. Mayor Guidi would like to implement a nuisance policy where buildings that are not in use would have to be maintained as if they were open.

- Curbing nuisance issues. (Guidi)

Mayor Guidi would like stronger ordinances need to be written regarding nuisance issues involving parked cars for sale, overnight parking of outsiders and prostitution.

- Film permit and other fees related to filming. (Juarez)

Councilmember Juarez thanked Business License Director Lisa Miller for the detailed report on film permit fees. Basically, what we charge for film permits is in the ballpark. It is recommended that we increase the hourly rate for the police officers in order to accurately reflect our costs. We are just trying to recoup the cost we spent in order to do this. The City Manager will prepare something and come back.

- Joining other local governments in any lawsuits / actions to protest State of CA raid of local revenues. (Juarez)

Councilman Juarez asked that the City Manager and the City Attorney be empowered to follow suit and join other California cities in filing a lawsuit to protect property tax and redevelopment agency dollars from being raided by Sacramento.
