

**MINUTES OF A REGULAR MEETING OF THE  
CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HAWTHORNE,  
CALIFORNIA HELD JANUARY 12, 2010.**

Mayor Guidi called the City Council, Community Redevelopment Agency, Parking Authority and Housing Authority meeting to order jointly and concurrently at 6:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers of City Hall, 4455 West 126th Street, Hawthorne, California.

ROLL CALL-Present: Councilmembers English, Juarez, Lambert, Vargas, Mayor Guidi.

Civil Service Commissioner Darlene Love gave the evening's invocation. Francis Stiglich led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas extended an invitation to join him on January 23<sup>rd</sup> at 9am at Cal State Dominguez Hills University for the 18<sup>th</sup> Annual Empowerment Congress. Marian Wright Edelman, the nation's preeminent advocate for child care and protection of children, will be the Keynote speaker. There will be several workshops that will focus on the issues of public safety, transportation, economic development, foster care and probation. H1N1 shots will also be available. Chairman Dick Huhn and board members of the Hawthorne Parks and Recreation Foundation presented a check for \$11,308.31 to the Teen Center. Proceeds from the check were acquired through a golf tournament that the Parks and Recreation Foundation holds every year. The proceeds are all always dedicated to something that is going to help out the leisure facilities somewhere in the city. For the last two years, proceeds have been dedicated to the Teen Center, bringing to a total of \$30,000 that the Foundation has donated to the Teen Center. There have been 18,000 attendees to the Center since it opened a little over a year ago.

Councilmember Juarez presented a trophy to South Bay Workforce Investment Board Executive Director Jan Vogel for being the winner of the Hawthorne Teen Center Ping Pong Challenge. The lively game of ping pong was held at the 1<sup>st</sup> anniversary celebration of the Teen Center.

Councilmember Juarez presented Certificates of Recognition to the winners of the 2009 Holiday Home Decorating Contest. The winners, who were in attendance, included Richard Benives Velez for best use of lights display; Norb and Linda Huber for best religious display; Alfredo and Amelia Gutierrez for best animation display and Marshall and Felicia Street for best total display.

Raphael Garcia and Jim Teehan of the Vasek Polak Clinic in Hawthorne provided statistics on the clinic and how it has been helping the community. The clinic opened in December of 2007. In 2008 there were a total of 3,443 people, 64% of them from Hawthorne, that visited the clinic and in 2009 a total of 5,513 visited, with 74% from Hawthorne. From these statistics, you can see that the clinic is doing its job in Hawthorne. It is providing access to healthcare for the uninsured and the underinsured. It also has diabetes classes and an outreach program to local schools and will be providing health screenings and information at the upcoming resource fair. Office visits are \$50, lab tests are \$10 and x-rays are \$30.

There was a great turnout as a community. Thanked Chief Heffner for the update on how the police department is using technology to respond to and reduce crime in Hawthorne. Announced that a

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neighborhood watch meeting is scheduled for February 6<sup>th</sup> at Atherton Baptist Church at 9am. Officers **Steve Colquette**, **Chris Komathy**, **Sean Galindo** and **Andrew Garton** of the Hawthorne Police Officer's Association, in the spirit of community and forging good relationships with the city, presented a check for \$1,000 to Councilmembers Vargas, English and Juarez to help cover some of the costs for the upcoming service provider fair on January 30<sup>th</sup>. **John Koppleman**, 5508 W. 118<sup>th</sup> Place, one of the founders of the Hawthorne Del Air Farmers Market, commented on how community reaction to the market has been phenomenal and how gratifying it is to see neighbors come out and shop at the market. The market sells only certified California grown fruits and vegetables. This coming weekend and in the foreseeable future, there will be train rides for the kids. Also introduced Susan Hillyer, the Market Manager, who announced that Bally's Gym on El Segundo Blvd. will be coming to the market to do a free community workout. Introduced Reflexologist Hope Smith from Health and Wellness Professionals, who announced that she will be speaking at the market on Reflexology, Essential Oils and Ionics. Everyone is welcome to attend the market on Saturdays from 9am to 1pm at 135<sup>th</sup> Street and Aviation. **Frances Stiglich**, 11534 Gale Ave., reported on the long emergency room visit she encountered at Torrance Memorial and neighbors playing loud music. **Leithelle Williams**, 4054 138<sup>th</sup> St., expressed concern over sandbags and tarps that have been left behind in front of the drains on Rosecrans. Requested speed humps on Yukon and 147<sup>th</sup>. **Darlene Love**, 2003 W. 116<sup>th</sup> Street, reported that there was a water break on Wilken and Van Ness on Saturday night which caused some in Hollypark to be without water for 3 ½ hours. - Ordinance No. 1921 – Limiting councilmember comments (English)

Councilmember **Lambert** thanked the police association for their contribution to the event coming up. Commended Jan Vogel on the growth of the youth center. Thanked Chief Heffner, Sgt. Swain and Mayor Guidi for looking out for her during the holidays. Thanked Public Works Director Arnie Shadbehr for marking all the parking spots along Hawthorne Boulevard. Thanked City Attorney Russell Miyahira and Risk Manager Dennis Hernandez for working hard during the holidays to get \$750,000 returned to the city by September where it rightfully belongs. Thanked everyone for the holiday cards and to the person who sent the Starbucks card. Thanked Alex and Thierry for delivering turkeys for her. Thanked Mark Hardison for all the work he has done, all the directors who have done a fine job and leader Jag Pathirana.

Councilmember **English** thanked Congresswoman Waters who sent a letter commending our efforts to put on the service provider fair. Congresswoman Waters will also be participating by hosting a table and providing valuable services to the community. Thanked Assemblymember Steve Bradford for congratulating our efforts and for providing a table at the service provider fair and providing valuable information to the community. Various organizations such as Parks & Recreation, Public Works, Police Department, Golden State Water Co., West Basin Water Co., Southern California Edison, California Gas Company, California Water Co., AT&T, Time Warner, Vasek Polak Clinic, South Bay Family Center, the US Census Bureau, Los Angeles Airport, South Bay City Council of Governments and California Volunteers, who sent 200 emergency preparedness kits, will be participating. Requested that the amended section on employee qualifications and requirements that removed a felony conviction as disqualification be brought back, that the issue be revisited and that the city attorney make an amendment on this item.

Councilmember **Juarez** thanked Public Works Director Arnie Shadbehrr for the update on the contamination in the Hollyglen area. Wished the very best to former Director of Planning & Community Development, Harold Roth, who retired last month and introduced the Acting Director, Gregg McClain. Asked that the employees who received their pins for service years at the Christmas luncheon be recognized by being put on screen. Congratulated those that were promoted within the police department; they include Mike Ishii who was promoted from Lieutenant to Captain; Steve Romero from Sergeant to Lieutenant and Chris Wiley from Police Officer to Sergeant. This Friday night there will be a celebration for retiring Officer Tom Jester who has served for 33 years. Thanked Chief Heffner for the report on rear end coded collisions at photo enforced intersections; the report stated that there is no basis for the assertion that red light cameras cause accidents. The American Lung Association put out a report titled "State of Tobacco Control Report" which said that you may see a lower grade for your city in 2009 than in 2008. Asked if there is something we can do to improve these numbers. Encouraged everyone to participate in the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Battle of the Badges blood drive on February 10<sup>th</sup> from 9am to 3pm at the police station. Requested that the report on new businesses in the city be distributed to Council. Inquired on when the mid year status on expenditures report will be available. Requested a presentation for the next meeting on where we are regarding Bicentennial Park.

Mayor **Guidi** thanked everyone who participated in the food and toy drives for needy families. Reported that we lost two businesses in the city, Somerville Plywood and the Soicher-Marín Gallery, but a new bakery has opened at the Century Business Center. Thanked Patricia Donaldson, the Chamber, HAX and all the volunteers from Hope is Helping that held the toy and food drive.

City Clerk **Huber**, in an effort to make his office and city government more transparent, invited the public for coffee at the City Clerk's office before the next Council meeting. This is an opportunity for the public to be more involved and for the Clerk to informally meet and greet the public.
